

Batteries are classified as hazardous waste



Overview

WEEE often has components that contain hazardous substances or persistent organic pollutants (POPs). These could include:

- printed circuit boards. Components such as screens, circuit boards, batteries or any plastic parts may contain hazardous chemicals or POPs. (*) An asterisk at the end of a code means the waste is hazardous.

Components such as circuit boards, motors and any plastic parts may contain hazardous. Components such as circuit boards, motors or any plastic parts may contain POPs. Usually there is not enough for the item to be classified as POPs waste.

Defra's Latest POPs Guidelines for Lead Acid Batteries

To comply with POPs regulations, lead acid batteries that contain or are suspected to contain POPs must be destroyed using one of the following methods: Incineration: Utilise an incinerator classified as D10 or R1 (for hazardous waste, municipal waste, or cement kiln). Metal Smelting: Employ a metal smelter classified under R4 to destroy the POPs.

- Most batteries are classified as a priority waste (EPA waste classification: e-waste, waste code T300) and have waste duties² as they apply to your activities.
- Lead-acid batteries (waste code D220) and nickel-cadmium batteries (waste code D150) are classified as reportable priority waste.

In states with bioassay requirements (Alaska, California, Minnesota, Rhode Island and Washington), alkaline batteries are classified as hazardous waste and can be disposed through the DRMO or through local contract. There may be an exception for household waste; therefore, contact your state regulator. ...

Dealing with waste lithium batteries

Waste management companies are likely to err on the side of caution where batteries are concerned: for example Wastecare, which is a partner in the Batteryback scheme, consigns all batteries as hazardous waste. Where lithium batteries are mixed with other types of battery the consignment should be classified as hazardous waste.

There is no minimum load for bulk carriage so ADR/CDG apply in full. This is fully understood by the relevant trade association ...

All waste batteries are classified as hazardous waste and recycling is always the best option. Ordinary household batteries do contain some hazardous chemicals so ideally should not be thrown out with the day to day rubbish. Rechargeable batteries contain harmful metals, so should never be thrown away with daily rubbish, they should be returned ...

Batteries containing lithium are classified as “dangerous” under the Carriage of Dangerous Goods Act, while nickel cadmium batteries meet the definition of “hazardous” under the Hazardous ...

Hazardous Waste

Some hazardous wastes can be recycled, including lead-acid batteries, and some waste is not considered as potentially harmful as hazardous waste, and fall into the category of universal waste. ... similar to domestic waste, while 20% is classified as hazardous material, which may be infectious or toxic or possess radioactive properties.

What to do with damaged lithium batteries

At the moment, Lithium batteries are not classified as hazardous waste by the Hazardous Waste Regulations 2005. Lithium metal is, however, mentioned in the Environment Agency's guidance on hazardous waste (WM3) as a substance whose presence could render a waste hazardous on account of its flammability.
